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Year of St. Joseph - 2021

A message from the Spiritual Director

We, the faithful people of the Diocese of San Jose are extremely blessed. The Holy Father, Pope Francis issued a decree launching a special year dedicated to St. Joseph, our diocese' very own patron saint, hailing him as a model of fatherhood and a key intercessor in modern times.

In the words of the Holy Father, "every member of the faithful, following his example, may strengthen their life of faith daily in the complete fulfillment of God's will." He proclaimed the special "Year of St. Joseph," to begin on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception 2020 and extend to the same feast in 2021.

Pope Francis describes St. Joseph as a beloved, tender, and loving father. An obedient and accepting father. A father who is creatively courageous, a working father, a father in the shadows.

To answer a few questions that we might have, I have compiled some information from the Vatican website with regards to this special year dedicated to St. Joseph:

Why does the Church have years dedicated to specific topics?

The Church observes the passage of time through the liturgical calendar -- which includes feasts such as Easter and Christmas, and seasons such as Lent and Advent. In addition, however, popes can set aside time for the Church to reflect more deeply on a specific aspect of Catholic teaching or belief. Past years designated by recent popes include a Year of Faith, Year of the Eucharist, and Jubilee Year of Mercy.

Why did the Pope declare a year of St. Joseph?

In making his declaration, Pope Francis noted that this year marks the 150th anniversary of the saint's

Year of St. Joseph - 2021

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proclamation as patron of the Universal Church by Pope Pius IX on December 8, 1870.

Pope Francis said the coronavirus pandemic has heightened his desire to reflect on St. Joseph, as so many people during the pandemic have made hidden sacrifices to protect others, just as St. Joseph quietly protected and cared for Mary and Jesus.

"Each of us can discover in Joseph, the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence, an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble," the Pope wrote.

He also said he wanted to highlight St. Joseph's role as a father who served his family with charity and humility, adding, "Our world today needs fathers."

What special graces are available during this year?

As Catholics pray and reflect on the life of St. Joseph throughout the coming year, they also have opportunities to gain a plenary indulgence, or remission of all temporal punishment due to sin. An indulgence can be applied to oneself or to a soul in Purgatory.

An indulgence requires a specific act, defined by the Church, as well as sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, prayer for the Pope's intentions, and full detachment from sin.

Special indulgences during the Year of St. Joseph can be received by praying for the unemployed, entrusting one's daily work to St. Joseph, performing a corporal or spiritual work of mercy, or meditating for at least 30 minutes on the Lord's Prayer.

Why does the Church honor St. Joseph?

Catholics do not worship saints but ask for their heavenly intercession before God and seek to imitate their virtues here on earth. The Catholic Church honors St. Joseph as the foster father of Jesus. He is invoked as the patron saint of the Universal Church. He is also the patron of workers, father, and a happy death.

In this time of uncertainty in light of the Coronavirus pandemic, it is appropriate to seek the intercessions of the saints for guidance and protection. St. Joseph, the foster father of Jesus Christ, also the guardian and protector of the Church can truly be our intercessor. I invite you, my dear brothers, and sisters in the Cursillo movement. Let us join in heartfelt prayer and take his life as our model for fulfilling our personal call to holiness.

Ask and you shall receive an answer

Q: What metrics should we look at in filling up the quadrant sheet for the corridor work in Step by step? If the candidate is seen in church, if he volunteers for church work, which quantitative metrics? If we refer to qualitative metrics, how do we note that since it would most likely be only the sponsors who could attest to qualitative metrics? In our diocese, many times sponsors don't serve and will not be available in the Weekend nor do they attend Sponsors' night. One thing for sure, we should have standard metrics for the quadrant sheet so that we're talking about the same thing.

A: Quadrant Sheet - A list is made of the new Cursillistas assigning them numbers 1 to 4 in terms of where they are in their relationship to God. (1 being very close to God, 4 being far from Him). The same thing is done according to their attitude to the Cursillo itself.

Pre-Cursillo calls for both the sponsor and team leaders to meet with the candidates to get to know them before the Cursillo weekend. This was made clear during the Pre-Cursillo talk during the National Encounter in Scranton.

"In the Pre-Cursillo, the team of leaders would have to dedicate the biggest percentage of their time praying for the spiritual success of the Three Day Cursillo, and the rest of the time getting to know the candidates and preparing the rollos. If the Pre-cursillo has been done as it should and the leaders know the candidates well, not just by phone, email, nor on the first night of the Three Day Cursillo but because they have met with the candidates several times and are now friends, then the work of the groups at the Three Day Cursillo is quite positive". (Pre-Cursillo Rollo, Miguel Sureda, 2019)

If the sponsor and team leaders know the candidate, they will know how to fill out the quadrant sheet. What kind of relationship does the candidate have with God and how open is he to attending Cursillo? See the example below.

Relationship to God

1- Very Close 2 - Close

3 - Far 4 - Very Far Attitude to attend Cursillo 1- Very Open

2- Open 3- Closed

4- Very Closed (-- National Cursillo English coordinator Cef Aguillon)

Q: We're all finding ways to persevere in the lockdown. Some of us are doing great things on the internet and social media. But this also brings to light a problem: we notice a saturation point where we've invited almost everybody to witness at Ultreyas. So, we find sometimes that we are hearing the same stories but now it's online. Can we invite brothers and sisters from other dioceses to share their witnesses so there will be new perspectives at the Ultreyas?

A: Yes, you can invite a Cursillista from another diocese to give a witness talk. I know it happens; however, we should not be hearing the "same if the Cursillista is growing in his/her Christian living and progressive conversion.

"The Witness Rollo, [at the Ultreya], is given by a Cursillista about how he or she lives the Christian life or how he or she would like to or is sad not to do so". (CDC Ultreya Rollo) If we base our witness on this criteria, then any Cursillista in attendance at the Ultreya should be able to give witness about`how they are livina a Christian life now. (-- National Cursillo English Coordinator Cef Aquillon)

Q: Friendship is one of the foundations of our movement. And yet there is no rollo dedicated to it nor a full Cursillo book treatment on it. The few citations on Friendship that we cite for SOL technique talks are great food for thought but not much for technique. A full treatise on Friendship explains Aristotle's premise up to virtuous friendship. It might be laborious but it would benefit some Cursillistas who have to fend off challenges like "friends have no secret from each other, are you my friend?" (at a group reunion). Or some whose notion of friendship is like a fraternity or sorority kind of requirement ("Why did you have to go outside of the group when we can just talk about it?") Clearly, what the Cursillo means as "Friendship' should be well defined. Aside from the Biblical quotes how do we define the friendship that the Cursillo refers to the property of the property o ship that the Cursillo refers to?

Q: Why did you want to be a Cursillista? Who sponsored you to the Weekend in what year? Who was your rector?

V: In 1983, our friends Mel and Connie Valderrama and Sam and Aster Pasion invited us to attend the Cursillo Weekend. Sis. Elsa and I agreed. Our Rector was Bro. Ric Posadas. I wanted to be a Cursillista in order to know more about the Catholic religion and grow spiritually.

Q: Can you list some of the sisters and brothers who were graduates of the first San Jose Filipino Cursillo movement in your Weekend? Was there an Action team that cooked for you in that Weekend? Was there a Mananita and, if yea, were they from the 4th day or another dioceses?

V: We were the first candidates in the San Jose Filipino Cursillo Weekend. Twelve candidates: Bro. Dean Fangonilo, Bro. Vic Evaristo, Bro. Max Ochangco, yours truly, and eight more that I cannot remember. One quit the following day. Our food was cooked by the Los Altos Seminary kitchen staff. We had Mananita and they came from other dioceses and some from San Jose Diocese who took their Cursillo in many different dioceses in the

US and the Philippines. The mananiteros were away from the candidates. No physical contact.

Q: Is there a difference in the rollos then vs. the rollos now and explain?

V: Yes, there are some minor differences in title and number of rollos. Each rollo had a dedicated manual. We did not have Cursillo Beyond Cursillo then. We did not have a 3-day manual such as we now have. Some titles were changed, like Layperson in the Church which is now Laity — Layperson in the Church in the World.

Q: From the first Filipino San Jose Cursillo Weekend, how many graduates returned to make Cursillo their primary apostolate? To which groups did the other graduates go? What Cursillo activity then is not being done today and why?

V: From the 11 candidates, I was the only one who made Cursillo as my primary apostolate. The others became CIA – Cursillista inactive. The others went to Couples for Christ. The Cursillo activities then that we do not have now during the Weekend are Agape during Friday evening after dinner and Sunday morning Mananita. One activity that we used to do was Bible study – weekly or every two weeks by individual Group Reunions in homes.

Q: Share with us some tips on how to recruit candidate for the Weekend. List some Cursillistas not related to you who are still active in the Movement. Who was the Cursillista that was the toughest to recruit, tell us the story of how you got him or her.

V: In my experience, persistence is needed. But the basic technique is making friends with co-parishioners, relatives and casual acquaintances and friends. Some of my recruits who are active today are Sis. Melinda Collins, Bro. Sam, and Sis. Elena Sebastian, Sis. Aurora, Bro. Leo, and Sis. Susana Alapan, Sis. Remy Hailey. I had three men candidates who were the toughest to recruit because it took three years before they showed up in the Cursillo Weekend. In two of those three years, they did not show up during the Cursillo Weekend.

Q: Since we can't gather and do face-to-face interaction, how do you propose we conduct our SOLs, Ultreyas and other activities? Can friendship exist without physical contact? If yes, how?

V: We have to make sure that all active Cursillistas know how to use their computers or cell phone to access video talks/presentations/programs. Those who are good in multi-media use should volunteer to teach other Cursillistas. Friendship can be maintained by video Group Reunions and Ultreyas.

Q: Step by step suggests that control of the Weekend post-rollo discussions be given to the candidate presidents without staff table leaders and deans. How do you suggest we rein in the discussions after the rollos so they don't go all over and over time?

V: The presidents should be assigned in advance on Thursday night and should be given training on how to handle a group discussion and should be directed by the rector when to stop the discussion.

Q: Because Step by step puts a premium on friendship, it has been suggested that we take two years to prep for a Weekend – first year to form friends for recruitment, then the second for team formation. Will we not lose momentum this way? How would you prep for the Weekend and still fulfill Step by step's requirement on friendship?

V: The Cursillo Weekend Team should be formed now and then embark on the program on how to build friendship among the team members and learn the techniques in making friends for candidate recruiting, again by using video/online medium.
