

#### From the Spiritual Director's Desk

#### The Church's stand on abortion

Currently, the Texas law banning abortion sparked debates. We've asked Fr. Francis to reply to some questions that need to be answered. He gives a clear view of the Church's stand on abortion. By Fr. Francis Kalaw

The Catholic Church's position on abortion is clear. In the magisterial document Donum Vitae (The Gift of Life) the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith affirmed that, "The human being is to be respected and treated as a person from the moment of conception; and therefore from that same moment his rights as a person must be recognized, among which in the first place is the inviolable right of every innocent human being to life," (Sec I.1) Direct abortion, or the intentional killing of a human being living in the womb, is always seriously immoral because as persons the right-to-life is the most basic and fundamental right we possess.

If the Bible absolutely forbids abortion, is there any dogma related to exemptions to abortion like saving a life, or victims of rape, incest? If yes, which dogma and what does it say? If there is no exemption, how do we address victims of rape and incest?

In Romans 12:21 Paul says that we should not be conquered by evil but that we should conquer evil with good. The act of rape is a grave sin and an injustice that claims too many people, most often women and children, as victims. The Church teaches that victims of rape deserve immediate medical, emotional and spiritual care. The Ethical and Religious Directives for Catholic Health Care Services (#36) states that Catholic healthcare providers have a duty to provide this care and to prevent the contraction of disease or the conception of a child. However, if a child is conceived in a pregnancy caused by rape, then this child is just as innocent and precious as the woman who was victimized and he or she should not be killed because of the actions of the rapist. The Church teaches that through mercy and love, a non-violent solution for both mother and child is far superior to helping a victim of violence (the raped woman) commit violence against her own child through abortion.

The argument against abortion is that basically, life is God's will and no man should have power over life. But at the close of the 20th century, great leaps have been made in cloning and its possibility as a cure for cancer. But cloning, like artificial insemination, is fast becoming a part of modern-day life. Has there been a definite dogma against cloning and artificial insemination?

#### **Cloning**

Cloning is a complex procedure by which scientists take a body cell such as a skin cell (somatic cell) and render the cell's nucleus into a primitive state so it is capable of guiding the development of another human being under the right conditions.

No one has yet engendered a human being through cloning but many scientists believe that this is only a question of time.



There are a number of reasons why someone would try to engender a new human life through cloning. None would be morally legitimate. For example, a couple may want to use a cell from a dying child to clone another baby as a way of perpetuating the life of the first child. Obviously, this would not be a continuation of the dying child but the bringing into being of a new child. The dying child would become the "progenitor" of a new life without having agreed to it; the new child would not be treated as a unique individual with his or her own identity but as an extension of another person.

A man or woman might also want to have a baby without getting married or involving a parent of the opposite sex. This would be terribly unfair to the child, depriving him or her of a natural father and mother.

Some may want to clone themselves, thinking that they are so intelligent and successful that a child with their attributes would be a great gift to society. This would be an act of supreme selfishness that would also deprive a child of a mother and a father.

Anticipating that one day the cloning of a human being might be attempted, Donum Vitae said this: "Attempts or hypotheses for obtaining a human being without any connection with sexuality through 'twin fission,' cloning or parthenogenesis are to be considered contrary to the moral law, since they are in opposition to the dignity both of human procreation and of the conjugal union."

#### In Vitro Fertilization

One reproductive technology which the Church has clearly and unequivocally judged to be immoral is in vitro fertilization or IVF. Unfortunately, most Catholics are not aware of the Church's teaching, do not know that IVF is immoral, and some have used it in attempting to have children. If a couple is unaware that the procedure is immoral, they are not subjectively guilty of sin. Children conceived through this procedure are children of God and are loved by their parents, as they should be. Like all children, regardless of the circumstances of their conception and birth, they should be loved, cherished and cared for.

But why, exactly, is IVF immoral?

In vitro fertilization brings about new life in a petri dish. Children engendered through IVF are sometimes known as "test tube babies." Several eggs are aspirated from the woman's ovary after she has taken a fertility drug which causes a number of eggs to mature at the same time. Semen is collected from the man, usually through masturbation. The egg and sperm are ultimately joined in a glass dish, where conception takes place and the new life is allowed to develop for several days. In the simplest case, embryos are then transferred to the mother's womb in the hope that one will survive to term.

Obviously, IVF eliminates the marriage act as the means of achieving pregnancy, instead of helping it achieve this natural end.

Human beings bear the image and likeness of God. They are to be reverenced as sacred. Never are they to be used as a means to an end, not even to satisfy the deepest wishes of an infertile couple. Husbands and wives "make love," they do not "make babies." They give expression to their love for one another, and a child may or may not be engendered by that act of love.

### The debate goes on when a fetus can be called a living being. If life can't be clearly defined and the soul can't be quantified, can artificial intelligence (AI) qualify as living beings?

In Rome last February 28, 2020, the Pontifical Academy for Life, Microsoft, IBM, the Italian Ministry of Innovation, signed as first the "Call for an AI Ethics", a document developed to support an ethical approach to Artificial Intelligence and promote a sense of responsibility among organizations to create a future in which digital innovation and technological progress serve human genius and creativity and not their gradual replacement.

The document says: "Al systems must be conceived, designed and implemented to serve and protect human beings and the environment in which they live. This fundamental outlook must translate into a commitment to create living conditions (both social and personal) that allow both groups and individual members to strive to fully express themselves where possible."


Building a world of respect for human life and dignity, where justice and peace prevail, requires more than just political commitment. Individuals, families, businesses, community organizations, and governments all have a role to play. Participation in political life in light of fundamental moral principles is an essential duty for every Catholic and all people of good will.

The Church is involved in the political process but is not partisan. The Church cannot champion any candidate or party. Our cause is the defense of human life and dignity and the protection of the weak and vulnerable.

The Church is engaged in the political process but should not be used. We welcome dialogue with political leaders and candidates; we seek to engage and persuade public officials. Events and photo ops cannot substitute for serious dialogue.

The Church is principled but not ideological. As St. John Paul II wrote in his encyclical, Sollicitudo Rei Socialis:

"The Church's social doctrine is not...an ideology, but rather the accurate formulation of the results of a careful reflection on the complex realities of human existence, in society and in the international order, in the light of faith and of the Church's tradition. Its main aim is to interpret these realities, determining their conformity with or divergence from the lines of the Gospel teaching on man and his vocation, a



vocation which is at once earthly and transcendent; its aim is thus to guide Christian behavior. It therefore belongs to the field, not of ideology, but of theology and particularly of moral theology.". (Sollicitudo Rei Socialis, no. 41)

We cannot compromise basic principles or moral teaching. We are committed to clarity about our moral teaching and to civility. In public life, it is important to practice the virtues of charity and justice that are at the core of our Tradition. We should work with others in a variety of ways to advance our moral principles.

In light of these principles and the blessings we share as part of a free and democratic nation, we bishops vigorously repeat our call for a renewed kind of politics:

- Focused more on moral principles than on the latest polls
- Focused more on the needs of the weak than on benefits for the strong
- Focused more on the pursuit of the common good than on the demands of narrow interests

### The Church's stand on abortion... cont'd

This kind of political participation reflects the social teaching of our Church and the best traditions of our nation.

Our 1998 statement, Living the Gospel of Life, declares, "Abortion and euthanasia have become preeminent threats to human life and dignity because they directly attack life itself, the most fundamental good and the condition for all others" (no. 5). Abortion, the deliberate killing of a human being before birth, is never morally acceptable and must always be opposed.

Laws that legitimize any of these practices are profoundly unjust and immoral. Our Conference supports laws and policies to protect human life to the maximum degree possible, including constitutional protection for the unborn and legislative efforts to end abortion, assisted suicide, and euthanasia. We also promote a culture of life by supporting laws and programs that encourage childbirth and adoption over abortion and by addressing poverty, providing health care, and offering other assistance to pregnant women, children, and families.

When was your Cursillo Weekend and who was your rector/rectora?


It was August 2015 with Sis. Robin Barkin.

### My 4th Day in Songs

Picture this: you were invited to deliver the 4th Day talk and you didn't work on it at all. Now, you're in the car headed for the Clausura. The Cursillistas in the car with you rolled out the red carpet just to bring you to the Weekend. They put you in a fully loaded vehicle and also, to shame.

You feel awful because they're giving you deluxe treatment but you can't tell them to shut off the music because you might offend them. You're concentrating hard and writing your talk in your mind but it's too hard to focus. This was happening to me. Since I don't know them very well, there was nothing else to talk about after the weather. So, the Cursillista riding shot gun is playing non-stop music with the satellite radio and the CD player. He's playing everything from the 60s, 70s, 80s and 90s, even OPM, hoping I won't get bored.

But all I want is to write my talk. And all I can see was the blinking digital displaying the artist performing the song playing. Then I remembered my creative writing instructor who said, "If you come up against a block, don't go against it. Get around it and find the narrow focus, find a pattern." I also remembered a krav maga practitioner who told me, "in a desperate situation, don't mess around with the chi and that kung-fu secret breathing non-sense. Grab what you can and strike."

When the SUV passed a billboard at the entry to an outlet, I could've sworn the Nike check mark logo looked like a flying bird. I wondered if this was a sign from the Holy Spirit. Then I saw the slogan, "Just do it." So, this is what happened to my talk.

This is also a cautionary tale to anyone who didn't prepare before delivering their talk.

After my Cursillo Weekend, the Piety Talk made a lasting impression on me. I was where you are right now, Brothers. The talk told us about the personalities we'd encounter when we got back. To expect a Pharisaical Pete and a Mechanical Mike. But I encountered totally different personalities.

So, the next Sunday I went to my parish, ready to match wits with a Holy Joe. But I encountered a gloom and doom dude who I will call MC Hammer because he told me, (From "Pray" sing:) "We got to pray just to make it today. Pray, pray."

Totally not what I expected. I backtracked and saw a grim-looking lector with a veil and a blue sash. I wanted to strike a conversation with her and tell her there should be joy in proclaiming the word.

But she was a diva like Mariah Carey and she told me (From "Make it happen" sing:), "If you get down on your knees at night and pray to the Lord He's gonna make it happen." That effectively shut me down.

I realized maybe it was too soon to evangelize on my own. So, I went back to my Cursillo group and attended the School of Leaders and the Ultreyas.

I embraced our diocesan Movement and one of the Sisters Sledge welcomed me with (From "We are Family, " sing:) "We are family. All my brothers, sisters and me!"

I also found when I needed to petition or consolation, like when I was going through surgery or when a loved one passed away, some of them like Dionne Warwicke would tell me (From "I say a little prayer," sing:) "I say a little prayer for you ... Forever, forever, you'll stay in my heart."

Typically, Cursillistas who just came out of their Weekend can't keep their feelings to themselves. Just like John Travolta who said (From "You're the one that I want," sing:) "I got chills they're multiplying and I'm losing control ... it's electrifying."

But there are also Cursillistas like George Michael who indulge in Careless Whispers. I told him we shouldn't gossip about other people's lives outside the group reunion. This kind of disturbed me.

Because the Cursillo seeks out agents of change to affect the environment, many Cursillistas are natural born leaders and quite impatient.

When nothing seemed to happen immediately after their Weekend, some of them complained like Mick Jagger who said (From "I can't get no satisfaction, sing:) "I can't get no satisfaction. Cause I try and I try."

Even though, at the start, they were eager like Peter Frampton who would stick by veteran Cursillista and say (From "Show me the way," sing:) "I want you to show me the way."

Sadly, some of them don't stay like Gary Valenciano who just one day gave up and said (From "Di bale na lang," sing:) "Hindi ko na alam kung makakaya ko pa. 'Di bale na lang kaya."

I was troubled by all these because nothing seemed to be going right.



### My 4th Day in Songs... cont'd

At first, I approached a nice, non-committal couple about my issues. I'll call them Peaches and Herb because they discouraged me from disturbing the status quo, saying (From "Rock the boat," sing:) "Said, I'd like to know where you got the notion. Rock the boat. Oh don't rock the boat, baby. Rock the boat. Don't tip the boat over."

I just didn't get clarity and got disappointed.

So, I asked a seasoned Cursillista who used to part his hair in the middle and wore round lenses.

I will call him John Lennon because he advised me (From "Let it be," sing:), "When I find myself in trouble, Mother Mary comes to me. Speaking words of wisdom, let it be. And in the hour of darkness, she is standing right in front of me. There will be an answer, let it be."

Somewhat reassured, I thought maybe I should broaden my perspective and see what other Movements are doing. You see, the Cursillo is a world-wide movement. So I went to the Region XI Encounter.

At the Regional, I was amazed at how the Hispanics do it. They started the Cursillo movement. And they made it look easy. One Cursillista whom I will call Carlos Santana evangelized this way (From "Evil ways," sing:) "You've got to change your evil way, Baby ... Lord knows, you got to change"

But the newest Cursillistas were the Koreans, whose way to evangelize was a bit trendy. They would say: "Christ is counting on ... (From Wonder girls' "Nobody:") "nobody, nobody but you! Nobody, nobody but you!"

After the Regional, I was somewhat re-charged and ready for the next challenge in my Cursillo life.

I served under a rector who I will call Barry Manilow. He liked saccharine songs and was sentimental and seemed to live only for the Cursillo Weekend. So he says (From "Trying to get that feeling again," sing:) "I've been up, down, tryin' to get the feeling again. All around tryin' to get the feeling again. That one that made me shiver. Make my knees start to quiver. I've look high, low, everywhere I possibly can."

A few years later I served under a totally different rector. He refused to do it the Cursillo way. We showed him the constitution, the manuals. But he defied everyone. I call him Frank Sinatra because he said (From "My way," sing:) "I ate it up and spit it out. I faced it all and I stood tall. And did it my way!"

But the real struggle came when a group of Cursillistas banded together and expressed their desire to disagree with policy at that time. They felt strongly about including the mananita with the outside community and wanted it to remain as part of the Weekend which was contrary to the policy at that time.

There were some postal carriers, a few National Guard reservists and even a UPS dude. That's a lot of uniforms, so I called them the Village People because their anthem was (From "You can't stop the music," sing:) "You can't stop the music! Nobody can stop the music!"

Because of opposing passions, our Movement was in danger of non-compliance and being dissolved.

There were many Cursillistas caught in between just like Karen Carpenter who cried (From "Hurting each other, sing:) "Can't we stop hurting each other. Gotta stop hurting each other. Making each other cry. Breaking each other's heart. Tearing each other apart."

This was also the time I realized that the sisters, not the brothers, wore the pants in the Movement. Because one sister, like Katy Perry roared (From "Roar," sing:) "I got the eye of the tiger, a fighter. Dancing through the fire. 'Cause I am a champion. And you're gonna hear me roar. Louder, louder than a lion. 'Cause I am a champion. And you're gonna hear me roar. (Oh-oh-oh-oh) (Oh-oh-oh-oh) you'll hear me roar. (Oh-oh-oh-oh) you're gonna hear me roar."

Then a few sisters banded together and took a page from the Village People. Like the Jackson 5 they vowed to continue the Cursillo come what may and they promised each other (From "I'll be there," sing:) "You and I must make a pact. We must bring salvation back. Whenever you need me, I'll be there!"

In the following years, our re-booted Cursillo movement in San Jose has persevered even through times when recruitment was low and in one year, when recruits did not show in the Weekend.

Today we say (From Labuyo's "Tuloy pa rin ako," sing:), "Wala nang mangyayari kung pag-isipan pa. Tuloy tuloy na lang. Sa puso at isipan, tuloy pa rin ako."

I once saw a bumper sticker that said, "The trouble with life is that it has no background music."

The little stories I told you are true. I just added the background music.

The Cursillo has given you the means to lead an extraordinary life. Life with Dialog Clarity and DTS Trusurround combined as it were.

The take-away from all this is that, Brothers, when you go back to your environment, you will find that you have changed but the world has not.

The Cursillo has given you a way of looking at life that we hope you will use to affect the places where you live, work and play. Sometimes, people won't understand you and somethings will stand out very clear to you but not to them.

Beyond going to Bible study, singing in the choir and being a lector, the Cursillo is more than that. It should now be your way of life. Your faith life should not end when you cut the guy in the parking lot after you just said "peace be with you" to him at Mass.

### A priest walks into a bar

Three engineering students are discussing what sort of god must have designed the human body. The first says, "God must be a mechanical engineer. Look at all the joints."

The second says, "I think God must be an electrical engineer. The nervous system has thousands of electrical connections." The third says, "Actually, God is a civil engineer.


