• World's first exorcism center in Manila: The St. Michael Center for Spiritual Liberation and Exorcism will soon rise on Bernardino Street, corner EDSA and Guadalupe Viejo in Makati. It took seven years to plan and fund, according to Director Fr. Francisco Syquia. Construction began in May for the Philippine Association of Catholic Exorcists headquarters.

• Pinoy priest given Vatican posting: Fr. Arnaldo Catalan from Manila, 35, was elevated to archbishop and transferred as chargé d'affaires at the China diplomatic mission. Pope Francis appointed him to be his representative in Rwanda Africa early this year. He is the fifth Filipino nuncio serving the Holy See.

• Another Pinoy saint in the making: Teofilo Camomot, the late Cebuano archbishop may soon be the next Filipino saint. From the Spiritual Director's Desk

Meditation on the war between Russia and Ukraine By Fr. Francis Kalaw

As we continue to witness the ongoing war in Ukraine, how should we as Catholic Cursillistas respond?

Almost 57 years ago, Pope Paul VI became the first pope to visit and address the United Nations. It was on October 4, 1965, the pontiff said: "No more war, war never again." He called for everyone to become peacemakers and to re-discover his non-violent roots. Fifty-seven years later, the same call continues to echo through our Holy Father Pope Francis.

Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, was sent by God as an alternative to this violence. This is specially highlighted on the cross when Christ offered his life for our sake. In the Bible, St. Paul called the message of the cross "foolishness." But that's exactly why Paul said what he did: "in the way of the world" responding to air strikes, tanks and armed soldiers with more air strikes, tanks and armed soldiers is the thing to do. In some sense, it's what we've always done and responding any other way would be foolish. But as Christians, as people, we cannot love our enemies as Jesus commands us to and simultaneously prepare to kill them. This is not the way of Jesus and this is not Christ-like.

And so, Jesus calls us to another way – what we can call the 'third way. But Jesus didn't just call us to this way, he lived it too. Christ scolded Peter as he resorted to violence saying to Peter, "Live by the sword, die by the sword." By accepting the cross, the Christ our Lord chose not to respond to violence with more violence, or sin with more sin. Jesus chose to be a peacemaker. And yet we continue again and again to live by the sword and die by the sword.

What then would it look like to be Christ-like in the current Ukraine crisis? First, like Jesus, we must pray. Pope Francis has called us to the "weakness of prayer" in response to this crisis, including a day of prayer and fasting for peace last Ash Wednesday and an act of consecration for Russia and Ukraine to Mary last March 25.

Second, and again like Jesus, we must stand against the oppressive powers and with the oppressed. In other words, we must be in solidarity with Ukraine. Third, like Jesus on the cross, we must actively resist violence with non-violence. In other words, we must be peacemakers. But this does not mean passivity. Peacemaking involves the active resistance of violence but not playing by the same set of rules as violence. Shane Claiborne, a Christian advocate of peace once said: "Peacemaking is about interrupting injustice without mirroring injustice, resisting oppressors without becoming oppressors." No more war, never again!

Statement by Bishop Oscar Cantú on U.S. Supreme Court ruling on Dobbs Vs. Jackson Women's Health Organization

Laws should reflect the values of society. We recognize that in a pluralistic society, there are several value systems. Yet, the Catholic Church wishes to uphold the protection of the most vulnerable, especially women in vulnerable situations and children, including those in the womb, as a fundamental human right for all. Therefore, the Church advocates for just laws that defend the vulnerable and for a culture that respects human life, from conception to natural death.

Thus, we welcome the Supreme Court's decision in *Dobb's v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, which has affirmed our dearly held belief that life is precious, valuable, and should be protected and that states have a compelling interest to protect the unborn and limit abortion.

While we celebrate this decision in many ways, our work has just begun.

For decades, the Catholic Church in California has supported women, children, and families – walking hand in hand with those in crisis pregnancies, supporting families by providing maternity services, parenting supplies and resources, housing assistance, mental health support, and advocating for increased social services.

From this experience of holding the hands of those struggling with the decision to have an abortion, we know that for many women, abortion is not a choice they *want* to make but rather a choice they feel they *have to* make. From our work with mothers and families, we know they don't *need* expanded abortion services. They need housing assistance, prenatal and postpartum care, protection from domestic violence, paid family leave, and maternity accommodations from employers. With rising inflation and soaring housing and healthcare costs, California is not an easy place to raise a child. We, the Church, pledge to expand access to life-affirming services that empower women in our state with the confidence that they won't walk through pregnancy or parenting alone.

The California Catholic Conference is fervently committed to ensuring women in California know they are supported and that there are options when facing an unplanned pregnancy. We challenge lawmakers to provide equitable assistance and commit new funding and resources for maternity and childcare. California needs to be a sanctuary for women, children, and families struggling to thrive in our state over those seeking abortions.

As we seek to contain the expansion of abortion in California and work to defeat the efforts of state leaders to enshrine abortion into the state constitution permanently, my brother bishops and I ask that all Catholics throughout the state meet this moment and actively engage through the California Catholic Conference, in their dioceses and parishes, and in their communities to help women, children, and families. It is not enough to claim we are for life; we must be the hands and feet of Christ working to make it a reality.

And while the Supreme Court's decision will save the countless lives, we look to increase our work to support California's women, children, and families and protect the sanctity of every human life.
